

"Dangerous Attitudes about AIDS"

Bert works in the fashion industry. In his words, "lives the high life and it just keeps getting better." He gets paid well and meets exciting lovers. He keeps boosting himself to cover an inner longing for a sense of stability and thinks that getting married will give him that stability.

- He will not admit that his reckless sexual actions could eventually lead to AIDS and death. He says that being in his profession is a dangerous. In truth, he could be in any profession without being so sexually reckless. He is playing Russian roulette as far as AIDS is concerned, and as far as his attitude about it is concerned.

- He says he cannot think about AIDS, that he does take precautions sometimes, but he cannot make that a priority. He

does not believe his gay feelings are a choice. He believes that he is driven by a passion, over which he has no control.

- Bert views his passion as a "good" thing. He puts a carefree air on top of his almost insane sexual drives for men. These drives for men to love him have to do with desperately wanting his father's acceptance and love. This goes back to his early childhood memories and sexual experiences that he is running from at top speed.

- Bert always has to be in a relationship. He cannot be alone. He has to be going somewhere fast, mentally and emotionally speeding at a fast pace. He does not want to slow down because he might experience his truer inner feelings of devastation. Even when Bert is sleeping, he is mentally racing and he does not want to sleep alone.

- He has buried his deeper feelings of loneliness and frustration. They are mostly in relation to his mother. He is terrified of women. If he would allow himself to get close to women, it would bring up an assortment of negative feelings. When he is with men, he acts out superficially, and convinces himself that he is having a wonderful time.

- He will not allow his truer intentions into his conscious awareness. Nevertheless, Bert has fleeting glimpses that are making him nauseous. He sees his shallowness and believes that his life will never go anywhere. He is angry. He says that he has everything he wants, but not what he really wants, which

- The essential cause is their son's reaction to their controlling and abusive choices in relation to him. For Bert to acknowledge that truth is the only way for him to find peace within himself.

Bert is only twenty-five and has his entire life ahead of him. He consciously feels that he cannot keep going at this pace. It is getting more difficult for him to keep up his pretense, and strength. He is not in touch with his true subconscious intentions. Bert has a deeper intention in his recklessness in sex. At times, when he feels over the edge and hopeless, he will get strong desires to be sexually reckless. At these times, he does not consider precautions. At these times, he is literally trying to kill himself. He knows this, and yet he does not care. []

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
